Designed by Oxford architect Joe Wespiser, Cook Place is a simple residence designed in a vernacular Spanish Mission style. It is two stories in height, clad in white stucco and a red clay-tile gabled roof. The rectangular building has a projecting gabled pavilion on the main facade containing a recessed entry door with 'Casa de Manana' (House of Tomorrow) inscribed in the door lintel. Other features that typify the style are casement windows with brick header sills, brick header details at the eaves, a wrought iron window balcony, and exposed rafters below a window bay. On the north side is a stucco exterior chimney surmounted by a clay tile cap with arched openings. A rear door on this side has an arched opening.

43. History and Significance (Continue on Reverse if necessary)

Originally built in 1932 and acquired by Miami University in 1936, Cook Place is unique on the university campus because of its design and materials in a Spanish style. It was originally built as the home of Dr. Robert Harvey Cook, Miami class of 1891, who operated the Oxford Retreat Sanitarium with his father Dr. Harvey Cook. The original Retreat building was the building built as Oxford College for Women. After its purchase by Miami in 1925, the building was renamed Fisher Hall and used as a men's dormitory. Patients were moved to The Pines, which was renamed Wilson Hall after its purchase by Miami in 1936. This house was also obtained as part of the 1936 acquisition, but Dr. Cook continued to reside here until his death in 1949. Cook Place was remodeled in 1951 and became the home of continued.

44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings (See #52)

The house is located on the East Campus of Miami University in a residential setting with mature trees. There is a curved sidewalk leading to the front door. Both it and nearby Cook Field are named to honor the Cook family who operated the Oxford Retreat on this site.


