Dennison Hall is a 3-1/2 story, U-shaped, red brick building. The symmetrical farade faces west, with a central entrance and gable end projections. A two-story porch covers the entry. The porch is supported by lonic columns and has a geometric balustrade and cornice modillions. The nine-light wood door has a large surround, with a curved pediment. Secondary doors, on the fatade in the gable ends and the side elevations, have nine-lights and a simple entablature surround. Other features of the building include 8-over-8 window sash, Flemish bond brick pattern, splayed-brick lintels (some on the first floor have keystones), fanlight windows, cornice modillions and pedimented dormers. The one-story Erickson Dining Hall attaches to the rear of Dennison Hall, via an enclosed passageway. The dining hall features 15-over-15 window sash and a bay window centered on the south and north elevations. Window openings have splayed-brick lintels with a keystone and wood panels below the sill. A beltcourse encircles the entire building below the roofline. An outside entrance into the dining hall has paired nine-light wood doors, with an entablature surround and round continued..

43. History and Significance (Continue on Reverse if necessary)

Completed 1957-1959 at a cost of \$1,550,000, Dennison Hall was built in two phases. The first phase was completed in 1957 and designed by Charles F. Cellarius. The second phase, the north wing, was completed in 1959 and designed by Cellarius and Hilmer. The dining hall addition, Erickson, was completed in 1961 and designed by Cellarius and Hilmer. Dennison Hall, designed to house 300 male freshmen, was dedicated in June 1961. The building was named in honor of William Dennison. An 1835 graduate of Miami, Dennison was a well-known mid 19th century Ohio politician. He served as an Ohio state senator, Ohio governor, and as the U.S. Postmaster General. He was also a very successful businessman.

44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings (See #52)

Dennison Hall is in the northeastern portion of the campus. It faces Collins and McBride Halls, forming a small quad, and is in the area that was referred to as the men's quadrangle in the early 1950s, and is now called East Quad.


