decorative shaped wood panels. The house has original clapboard siding with wood corner boards and belt course between first and second floors. The front porch has three square Doric posts supporting a decorative frieze panel with dentils. The porch balustrade has narrow square balusters. On the east side of the house is a square projecting bay with three windows. On the west is a large 4-windowed square bay with decorative brackets.

43. History and Significance (Continue on Reverse if necessary)

This house is a good example of a transitional Queen Anne residence from the early 1900s. Built about 1910, it is named for the family who sold the home to Miami University. Dr. Fred Bunyan Joyner, one of Miami's most colorful professors, had the distinction of living in the last private residence that was completely surrounded by the university. Joyner was a professor of American history at Miami from 1922 until his death in 1965. In 1966 a Joyner Memorial Scholarship Fund was established in his memory. That same year, the Joyner family sold the house to Miami. It was used as the financial aid office at one point, and today houses offices for the School of Fine Arts.

The Joyner House is located in the heart of the Miami University campus, among dormitories and academic buildings. It occupies a grassy site with shrubbery and several trees.
