

Specific Address or Location 501 South Patterson Avenue Presser Hall is a large two-story academic building with steep gabled roof, horizontal main block with end wings, and a large central auditorium wing at the rear. The roof is slate and the entire structure is faced in uncoursed field limestone, the material also used for several other buildings on the Western campus. Presser's symmetrical main facade includes three projecting pavilions with stepped triangular parapets, giving the building a Jacobethan Revival style. The central pavilion holds the entry, accented by a smooth cut-stone, flat-roofed entrance portico with three pointed-arch bays and paneled battlements at the cornice. A set of steps leads to the porch front; curving concrete ramps with wrought iron railings have been added to access the porch from each side. Above the porch are three window bays at the second floor; a name plate with 'Presser Hall' and a single window are located in the gable above. The two end pavilions are plain, with two windows at the second floor only. Windows throughout retain their casement appearance and have label hoodmolds of smooth stone. The stepped triangular parapets and fenestration details are used on the side wings continued... 43. History and Significance (Continue on Reverse if necessary) Presser Hall was constructed to house the music program for the Western College for Women, which had a strong tradition of music education. The building was built at a cost of \$150,000, half of which came from a grant from the Presser Foundation of Philadelphia. Theodore Presser was a music educator, businessman and philanthropist who created the foundation, which received funds from his estate following his death in 1925. At the time of the dedication of Presser Hall in 1931, the Foundation president told those gathered that this building was one of nine made possible by the Presser Foundation at that time. Presser Hall served Western College's music program and served as the music hall and auditorium for large college events as well as performances by visiting artists. Acquired by Miami 44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings (See #52) Presser Hall faces Patterson Avenue at the edge of Miami's Western campus. It was built adjacent to the Edgar Stillman Kelley Studio, which housed the college's musical artist-in-residence beginning in 1917. To the west of Presser Hall is a ravine; its entry doors line up directly with a cobblestone bridge and walkway leading east across the ravine to other campus buildings.
